## BACKGROUND AND METHODOLOGY

* As a result of the Black Women's Roundtable (BWR) 2014 Exit Poll, BWR has partnered with ESSENCE for the past three years to conduct the Power of the Sister Vote Poll, which gauges the political attitudes and concerns of Black women across the country.
* ESSENCE in partnership with The Black Women's Roundtable conducted the $3{ }^{\text {rd }}$ Annual Power of the Sister Vote Poll and released the results on September 20, 2017. The survey was fielded online between July $6{ }^{\text {th }}$ and 11th, 2017.

ESSENCE Insiders panel members and the 2017 ESSENCE Festival attendees participated in the survey.

A total of 1,247 (1,001 ESSENCE Insiders members + 246
Essence Music Festival attendees) completed the survey

- ESSENCE Insiders received an entry into the panel quarterly sweepstakes; Festival attendees received a \$5.00 Amazon gift code for completing the survey

The goals of the survey were to:

- Collect feedback from Black women on their political outlook and issues they consider important to their community.
- Voice their opinion on Trump's presidency and share what they want the $45^{\text {th }}$ President and the $115^{\text {th }}$ Congress to address.
- Gauge Black women's activism and interest in running for office.
* Nearly (98\%) all of the respondents are registered voters.


## KEY FINDINGS

For the past three years, ESSENCE and the Black Women's Roundtable Intergenerational Public Policy Network have partnered to survey the political attitudes of Black women.

In the first study in 2015, we learned that $64 \%$ of Black women viewed voting as an important responsibility given the history of Black people. Black women overwhelmingly (78\%) believed the Democratic Party best represented their interest; in comparison, only $1 \%$ had trust in the Republican Party. We also learned that affordable health care was the top issuefor Black women.

The second study was conducted before the 2016 Presidential election, and the confidence in the Democratic Party increased to $85 \%$ with no change in support for the Republican Party. Also, affordable health care continued to be the top issue for Black women.

The 2017 survey conveys that Black women's support for the Democratic Party has declined over the past year, but there was no change in support for the Republican Party; there was a rise in the belief that no political party represents them; and President Trump received a failing grade.

This year, the top two issues for Black women are affordable healthcare and criminal justice reform. Living wage jobs \& quality public education tied as the \#3 top issues. Affordable healthcare remained the \#1 issue for Black women for the third year in a row. For millennial Black women, criminal justice reform continues to be their \#1 issue for the second year in a row.

Additionally, this year's survey added questions related to the community involvement of Black women, showing most are actively involved in their communities and faith institutions.

A majority of Black women (61\%) are active in their community, even more so for the ESSENCE Festival attendees (70\%).

- The ESSENCE Festival appeals to activists of all ages. In the 2016 Festival focus group research, a few participants stated that they come to the festival often to gain useful information to takebackto theircommunities.


## KEY FINDINGS(continued)

* The beliefthat the Democratic Partybest represents the interest of Black women has dropped significantly in a year, from $85 \%$ to $74 \%$. In fact, more Black women think that none of the political parties represent them well, up to $21 \%$ from $13 \%$ in 2016.
* Affordable health care is the top concern for one out of two Black women, ranking as the \#1 issue for three years in a row.
- A third of Black women in the current survey are concerned about the rise in hate crimes, a new issue added to the list.
- In 2017, nearly 1 in 2 Black millennial women identified criminal justice reform as their \#1 concern.


## Rating the New President

* President Trump's approval rating with Black women is abysmal. He received an F for his job performance, and $93 \%$ disagreed with the statement that "Trumpis addressing the issuesthat are mostimportanttome."


## What Black Women Want President and Congress To Address

* Protecting the Affordable Healthcare Act is the issue amajority of Black women (56\%) want the President and Congress toaddress now, confirming howimportant thisissueisfor them. Black women also want them to protect Medicare/Medicaid (18\%) and Social Security (14\%).


## Black women are activists, especially Festival Goers.

* Community activism is important to Black Women of all ages.
* ESSENCE Festival women (70\%) lead in activism when compared to ESSENCE Insiders (59\%)

## Black Women are mostly involved in their community and place of worship.

* Nearly, six in ten identify as community organizers.
* One in two is active in her place of worship and in community organizations.



## The majority of Black women continue to believe in the Democratic Party, although the support dropped significantly in a year.

* In the 2016 survey, Black women overwhelmingly (85\%) felt the Democratic Party best represented their interest, and according to a CNN Presidential election exit poll, $94 \%$ of Black women voted for Hillary Clinton.
* Democrats should take notice; the 2017surveyrevealedtherehas been a significant shift in trust among Black women, down from $85 \%$ to $74 \%$, an $-11 \%$ drop.

## Affordable Health care continues to be the top concern.

The top three concerns for Black women overall are affordable healthcare, criminal justice reform, quality public education, living wage jobs.In 2017, a third of Black women are concerned about the rise in hate crimes.$\square$ Black women appear to be less concerned about college affordability, expanding voting rights, right to reproductive choices and earned sick time/paid family leave over past years.
